Blakes Restaurant



The 'Opium Den' atmosphere and design of the restaurant continues the theme from the rest of the hotel - but even more so, with a heady mix of exotic bird feathers and Chinese prints on the walls. The menu includes Ginger consommé, Orange Salmon sashimi with green rice, coriander, Chicken and Coriander, Beef teriyaki, Lobster toast.



The hotel personifies gentle and elegant service that glides unobtrusively from room to room, and one is given the most discreet attention one could ever wish for - yet at the same time the place is busy, bustling, bohemian and beautiful.

Halkin



Moving towards Belgravia and Knightsbridge you will find another prestigious hotel - The Halkin. Described as an 'oasis of silence, relaxation and comfort', it offers an escape from London's busy streets. The four floors are decorated in different colours to symbolise the four elements of nature; fire, water, earth and air.



The simple elegant design of the rooms and suites invites the guest to relax, and in case you can't leave work behind, there three telephones with voicemail, internet and fax per room - in fact you can even lease the services of a personal secretary, which the hotel offers to its business clients.

The Zetter



The trend-setters amongst you should reserve a room in the 'designer hotel' The Zetter, situated in one of London's up and coming areas, Clerkenwell. Passing through stylish bars and galleries you will get to the entrance hall and walk through spectacular sliding glass doors into a reception area enlivened by a

chandelier made of pink glass lilies. The 59 individually decorated rooms can be reached through a spiral staircase from a dramatic archway.





Through use of decorated-panels, objets d'art, ceramics and furniture young artists and designers have transformed the 19th Century building into a mixture of Kubrick's "2001 Space Odyssey", a Louis XV ballroom, and the high gloss of Elle Decoration. The services available in the rooms are, however, very 21st century. Via a broadband connection, and an interactive TV or a laptop, one can access more than 4,000 digital music tracks for example. Our suggestion would be the 'Superior Rooftop Studio' with its 360° panorama view; you can celebrate the New Year in style with a bottle of champagne, a disposable camera (both available from the machine in the lobby) and nice company...
