The fifth in a series of 12 Russian 'sister ships', *Aji Petri* (as it was then named) ferried passengers and cargo between Odessa, Sevastopol and Istanbul until the early 1970s, when she was strategically placed in the North Atlantic by the Russian government, to (unofficially) 'eavesdrop' on other countries.

Following a mammoth 1,200,000-hour refit, carried out with an unlimited budget over seven years, *La Sultana*, as she's been renamed, is now for sale, and the specification is mind-boggling...

There are seven spacious and luxurious cabins (including the 66-square-metre owner's 'Suite Armateur'), each clad with precious woods and marble.
