Britain's turbo wedge



The Lotus Esprit S4S may never have garnered quite the same cult following as Porsche's Turbocharged offering, but that doesn't detract from what is otherwise one of the coolest cars to emerge from the British Isles. Featuring a Garret Turbocharger and one of the most majestic rear wings ever fitted to a car, this black 1996 Lotus Esprit S4S from down under certainly looks as menacing as any of Australia's fauna. With just under 60,000 miles on the clock, this rare beast has been steadily enjoyed over the years, but judging by the near-perfect interior, it has also been fastidiously maintained. <u>Now available with Young timers Garage</u>, this could be your chance to get your hands on one of just 367 Esprit S4S Turbos ever made.

Mille Miglia masterpiece
